It is a pleasure to have a new set of students to teach this year. We have started off this term with an intense effort in improving the reading levels of our students. Alhumdulillah, with the pleasure and grace of Allah (SWT), Years 8-11 have started off the year with enthusiasm and interest.

This seems to be especially true for the Year 11 students in Business Studies and CaFS, which our students are taking seriously and with great dedication. In addition to this, students in Year 9 have been delighted with a #thuglife approach to Mathematics — Mathematics makes so much sense, and is such a delight to learn, when students take an interest in it. Nevertheless, Mathematics requires dedication and hard work if one is to excel in it, and unfortunately, very few students are willing to put in the hard work required. And of the few that are willing to put in the hard work, most don't know how to "study".

Which brings me to the main point of this article. "Study" does **not** mean 'homework'. These are two separate and distinct terms. Homework must be done in order to learn current content and keep up with the classwork. "Study" means "revision". In other words, "study" means to go over content from previous weeks and terms — again and again and again. As a good general rule of thumb, 1 hour a week per subject should be dedicated towards revision. Students who really wish to excel should be making notes and summaries of knowledge they are gaining in school as they learn it (in other words, as a sort of voluntary homework each night). Then, these notes and summaries can be used for revision in future weeks and months.

This is all good in theory, but it will simply not happen without parent intervention, at least in the starting stage. Parents need to take out time from their undoubtedly busy schedules, and enforce a homework/study routine and good work ethic. Not only will this instil the value of education into our children, but it will also ensure our students are gaining the best education possible. While tutors are helpful when a child needs to catch up with his or her peers, the above is all that is necessary in most cases for students who are able to keep up with school work.

I make dua that Allah helps us throughout the year, and enables our students to understand the importance of ongoing revision.

Transitioning to Year 11 Friends Science State of the Science State of

It is pleasing to see our Year 10 students make a smooth transition into Year 11. Students have now completed their first assessment task for many of their preliminary HSC subjects and have received feedback. The teachers have been working hard to consolidate their learning and prepare them to respond to the challenging questions we often see in the HSC examination papers.

All students were issued with an HSC assessment booklet and calendar for Term 1 2017, as well as a copy of the school assessment policy. I would highly recommend that students and their parents become familiar with our new senior assessment policy and examine the assessment schedules and requirements for each of their courses.

Often these tasks and deadlines can lead to feelings of stress and anxiety. Many kids fear letting their family down, so be wary of setting unrealistic expectations! Some worry they can't do as well as a sibling or friend, or feel overwhelmed about what lies ahead in their post school life. We need to understand that people under pressure become

supersensitive and explosive from time to time. Family members are usually the first targets. Try not to overreact. Despite this, we need to set realistic targets and goals. Not all HSC students will go on to university - but they can still have a wealth of excellent and satisfying career options. There are also many pathways to tertiary education for those who want to follow the traditional path. It is important to encourage a healthy balance between work and leisure, and overworked students should be encouraged to participate in regular social gatherings of their interest.



Year 8 Science students have been exploring different chemical reactions to investigate the etiquettes and techniques of working in the laboratory. Students observed a demonstration by their teacher, Ms Nazmun, called Elephant's Toothpaste. As we know, it is very important to brush our teeth to keep them clean, but what about elephants? They also need to keep their teeth clean! That is why year 8 have decided to observe the demonstration that could make an elephant's teeth glistening white.

This experiment involved a range of chemical reactions that the students had learned about in class. Year 8 were initially impatient during the experiment as they could not see a reaction taking place. Some students thought that it would not work, while others were hopeful of its success. However, when the final reactant was placed in the solution, the result displayed an exciting red colour. Year 8 students were impressed with the result- a foamy substance shot up from the top of the glass cylinder! This was the Elephant's Toothpaste!

However, the substance formed is a dangerous hot substance that is harmful if it comes in contact with the skin or ingested, as it contains a variety of acids and bases. Year 8 concluded that this toothpaste might be suitable for stripping colour out of the elephant's teeth, but it's definitely not suitable as a toothpaste!



This experiment is sometimes called "Elephant's Toothpaste" because it looks like toothpaste coming out of a tube.

Welcome to the Centennial park excursion for the Year 11 Biology class.

Students were taken to Centennial Park bright and early on Wednesday morning of week 6, where they experienced a hands-on approach to this term's Biology topic, 'Local Ecosystems.' Students used data collecting field equipment such as hygrometers, anemometers, and electrical conductivity metres to collect information that assisted them to form an environmental opinion of an urban open space, while simultaneously assisting their project and assessment work in the classroom. Their practical interactions allowed them to see, feel and listen to nature firsthand. They then applied their existing knowledge of the local area while measuring biotic and abiotic factors and relating these to competitive, symbiotic and trophic relationships within an ecosystem.


