

Our Prime Focus

We have discussed this topic in the past, and will continue our discussion every now and then, as it is the most important aspect of our educational philosophy. We strongly believe that if the behaviour and attitude of a student towards his life is corrected, everything else automatically follows. If a student is disrespectful towards his teachers, parents, fellow students, friends, school community and towards the property of the school, and persists in causing disruption and damage to the educational

environment, he/she can never earn any respect and furthermore, can never learn anything effectively during his schooling. As such, our prime focus is upon managing the behaviour of the students.

We have developed a very effective behaviour management system and have set up policies to implement this system. Most of our Professional Development (PD) sessions incorporate this topic in the agenda. Our discipline policy is also constantly improving through our experience of implementing behaviour management systems, strategies and through thought provoking sessions on related topics. In our first PD of Term 1, 2014, our coordinators and I gave a lot of information on this topic through PowerPoint presentations. On the PD of 11th April 2014, we have planned activities to demonstrate and display the importance of this topic. At the end, prizes will be given to the participating and winning staff members. With this information, I am requesting all the parents to be a part of our behaviour management system, and to attend to all the correspondence we are constantly sending you for your understanding about this very important

Firstly, I would like to extend a warm welcome to all parents, staff and the wider community. In my previous message, I welcomed two groups of students; namely the Kindergarten and the new High school students. I would say they have settled in very well and have now adjusted to their new and exciting routines with dedication and commitment. As the first term of 2014 comes to an end, students are well aware of the academic and behavioural expectations of WGS. Our classrooms have been buzzing with dynamic teaching and learning activities across all years and all key learning areas.

Amongst our many goals, it is a priority to cultivate a learning environment within our classrooms that achieves two main objectives. Firstly, we aim to improve students who have previously been underachievers, bridging the gap between their past progress and their current stage of schooling. Secondly, we intend to facilitate and refine high achievers, providing the inspiration and direction required for them to channel their talents and skills effectively. Our dedicated staff are employing all means to make this a reality. I also want to take this opportunity to provide some light on the muchanticipated NAPLAN examinations. In particular, I would like to discuss, or rather clarify, the 'big picture' regarding NAPLAN. What is the purpose of NAPLAN? What do these examinations tell us about the student? Firstly, these NAPLAN examinations are designed to assess cumulative literacy and numeracy skills which the child has developed over previous years of schooling, not to assess short term literacy and numeracy progression. For this reason, providing extra emphasis on these examinations in the form of NAPLAN specific preparation will not provide an accurate reflection of the progressive literacy and numeracy skills that should have been gained by the student over years of education. ACARA, the regulatory body responsible for NAPLAN, makes it clear that these nationwide examinations test core elements of the curriculum. Hence, the best preparation schools can adopt is to teach the curriculum effectively. Every time a student sits in an English or Math lesson, they are, by definition and by design, preparing themselves for the skills required to succeed in NAPLAN.

In addition to this, the NAPLAN results only provide a 'snapshot' of a student's performance at one particular point of time. This prompts the question, how should we interpret NAPLAN results? While keeping this discussion brief, I want to emphasise that as parents, teachers, and the wider community, the most appropriate frame of mind we should have while looking at the results is one enshrouded by the word 'improvement'. We should be asking 'How much improvement has there been since your last NAPLAN examination?' We should encourage and applaud students who have shown progression and movement through their respective stages. A student who has moved from a band 3 to a band 5 deserves appreciation for 'succeeding' in his or her NAPLAN endeavours just as much, if not more, than a student who has remained stagnant at a band 7 or 8 level.

On a final note, it is a pleasure to be part of an institution that is dedicated to facilitating, mentoring and developing successful Australian Muslims who can make a significant contribution to our local and wider community. I would like to thank all the staff of WGS for all their hard work this term and wish them a relaxing and safe break.

Many students from all grades have continuously impressed me throughout the term with their learning and understanding capabilities. The students have embraced the Islamic/Quranic/Arabic studies well, and have achieved amazing results.

I'm proud to inform you that 10 of my 30 Kindergarten students have received 100% in their exam. These students are: Moaaz R., Zain A., Maryam S., Raniya M., Ahsan M., Malatef D., M. Ibrahim U., Sarosh R., Noah B., and Shanum N. All Kindergarten students have achieved pleasing results with an average mark of 82%.

YEAR 2

Assalaamu Alaikum wa rahamatullhi wa barkatuhu. The students of year 2 have adapted well to the classroom routines and are now very much familiar with what and how to do things. It is a pleasure having many students being able to read, write and comprehend better than when they first started. I feel I have made a difference already even though this is only the first term. Insha'Allah as we go further ahead there will be more significant differences made. In Maths, some students have grasped the concept of trading in 2-digit addition and subtraction and telling time very well, while others may need more practice. Insha'Allah as we progress in these topics, these concepts will be reinforced. In science, there were experiments done with small and large rubber bands on a hollow cardboard (like a guitar) to observe the sound differences. Moreover, there were experiments done with cardboard boxes, foam, clothes and tissues to see the differences in the alarm clock sound. In HSIE, the students have a better understanding of how families were in the past and how they are now. We have made timelines and used the book 'My Place' as an exercise to identify the structural difference in the past and present.

For PDH we had an exciting incursion where the students had a first-hand experience with using microscopes to see blood cells, observe fingerprints, examine different parts of the body using models, and much more. In creative arts, the students got to paint on foam and used oil pastels to colour the flowers and fish. Then we brightened up the room with their beautiful artworks. There is an impressive piece of writing by one of our year 2 students, Inaayah A. There were some more inspiring pieces of writing by some other students which will be displayed in the upcoming newsletters Insha'Allah. I am proud to share that Mohamed A.
