

Assalamu alaikum

I want to take this opportunity to provide some light on the much-anticipated NAPLAN examinations. In particular, I would like to discuss, or rather clarify, the 'big picture' regarding NAPLAN. What is the purpose of NAPLAN? What do these examinations tell us about the student? Firstly, these NAPLAN examinations are designed to assess cumulative literacy and numeracy skills which the child has developed over previous years of schooling, *not* to assess short term literacy and numeracy progression.

For this reason, providing extra emphasis on these examinations in the form of NAPLAN specific preparation will not provide an accurate reflection of the progressive literacy and numeracy skills that should have been gained by the student over years of education. ACARA, the regulatory body responsible for NAPLAN, makes it clear that these nationwide examinations test core elements of the curriculum. Hence, the best preparation schools can adopt is to teach the curriculum effectively. Every time a student sits in an English or Math lesson, they are, by definition and by design, preparing themselves for the skills required to succeed in NAPLAN.

In addition to this, the NAPLAN results only provide a 'snapshot' of a student's performance at one particular point of time. This prompts the question, how should we interpret NAPLAN results? We should be asking 'How much improvement has there been since your last NAPLAN examination?'. We should encourage and applaud students who have shown progression and movement through their respective stages. A student who has moved from a band 3 to a band 5 deserves appreciation for 'succeeding' in his or her NAPLAN endeavours just as much, if not more, than a student who has remained stagnant at a band 7 or 8 level. On a final note, it is a pleasure to be part of an institution that is dedicated to facilitating, mentoring and developing successful Australian Muslims who can make a significant contribution to our local and wider community.

EDUCATION MATTERS

Be prepared!

Whether you're fumbling to find a pen or haven't done the homework, coming to class unprepared is basically asking for trouble and actually getting ready to get confused. Even worse, you likely won't be learning as much as you're worried about being asked for your homework by your teacher, or you'll be distracted trying to find a pen and paper to take notes. Being prepared for class every day is an essential part of being a good student and will improve your educational experience immensely. If you're not quite sure what that being a prepared student entails, here are some tips to help you get ready for class the right way.

- Always keep your bag fully stocked with supplies. That means having all your books for the day, having a calculator
 if you use it in class, and having MULTIPLE pens (of all colours) in different parts of your bag. Additionally, keep a
 small folder with paper or a little notebook with you so that even if you somehow forget or misplace your book, you'll
 have something to write on. Other supplies like tissues, sticky notes and tabs can be useful as well.
- Use the syllabus to know what is being covered and what is coming up. There should never be mystery surrounding when things will be covered or due in class. It's all right there on the syllabus from day one. Ask your teacher to explain the plan for the term. All teachers will be more than happy to see a student who is serious about learning. Have the plan jotted down in your diary.
- Do your homework and assignments seriously and on time. There really isn't much of a point to going to school if you are not doing your homework or assignments. Not only will you fall behind in your work, but frequently you'll be missing out on valuable discussions and further learning.
- **Review before class.** It never hurts to go back over your notes from last class before you head to your upcoming class. A quick review will help you remember where your teacher left off and get all the information fresh in your mind.
- Be organised. There are few better skills to learn as a student than solid organisation. Being able to find your notes, homework and other class essentials will go a long way towards helping you be prepared and getting the grades you want.

Stop being that kid in class who's always rustling around, struggling to come up with answers, is missing a pen and lost his book, walking in late and perhaps even talking in class because they don't know what's going on. Instead, start prepping for class ahead of time leaving your mind free to focus on the lessons your teachers are presenting.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Western Grammar School is participating in the **Premiers Reading Challenge 2015**. Participating in the PRC program is one of the strategies being used by our school to improve reading and comprehension skills across K-9. The challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in our students. It is not a competition but a challenge for each student to 'read, read more and to read more widely'. To qualify for NSW Premier's Reading Challenge, students in **Kindy to Year 2** need to read **30** books and students in **Year 3-9** need to read **20** books. Each child has been given a student's reading log sheet to record the books read. This record must be submitted to the class teacher by **31**st **of July 2015**. Once your child has read the required books they are to hand in their reading logs to the office.

The **Islamic Book Fair** will be held from the 5th - 12th June 2015. Parents are welcome to come and look at our book displays during the day. The school will be getting 20% off all sales in Islamic books for the library. Therefore we strongly urge the parents to participate in this book fair and help the school. Wish lists will be sent home with students on Friday 5th June Inshallah.

CANBERRA EXCURSION

On 23rd April, Year 5- 9 students attended the HSIE field trip to Canberra. The field trip was an important task that enhanced the students' understanding of Australian History, Civic & Citizenship concepts. This excursion relates specifically to the unit Democracy Foundation, as well as 'Australia in World War 1 and the ANZAC legacy', and allowed students to investigate the natural and human impacts of our physical environment of our national capital city, as well as conducting field work tasks. This excursion provided great insight of the democratic process in our country. It also acted to prepare our students for the upcoming S.R.C. elections; these will take place in Term 2 at Western Grammar School. 

IMPORTANT REMINDER/ANNOUNCEMENT

Your cooperation regarding the traffic management of the school is important for the smooth operation of the school and for the greater benefit and growth of the school. Please adhere to the following instructions and Inshallah picking up your kids will be easeir.

All parents are requested to use the Bottles Road entrance for pickup and drop off. Cannery road entrance is strictly not allowed for pick up and drops. We have attached a map as a guide for parents to follow so that traffic congestion can be minimized at home time. Parents travelling from Mt Druitt coming on Hyatt Street should turn right on Cannery Road, left on Sardyga Street and then left again on Bottles road for picking up their child/ren. Parents travelling from Oakhurst Road should turn left on Cannery Road, left on Sardyga Street and left again on Bottles Road to access the school pickup and drop off area. Parents using Rooty Hill North Road to come to school should use Bottles Road to access pick up

and drop off area.



Ingredients:

Lunch Box Idea: Pizza Scrolls

- 2 cups Greek-style yoghurt
- 2 cups self-raising flour
- 1 cup Italian tomato cooking sauce
- 3 cups mozarella cheese, grated
- 100g left over chicken (or beef if you prefer)
- 1 tbsp Italian herbs and spices blend

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 190°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper and set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine the yoghurt and self-raising flour and mix until a ball forms. Turn out onto a floured bench and knead for 5 minutes. Add extra flour if the dough is too sticky.
- **3.** Roll the dough into a large rectangle of even thickness using a rolling pin.
- 4. Spread tomato sauce evenly over the entire dough surface.
- 5. Sprinkle left over chicken and 2 cups of cheese all over the tomato sauce.
- 6. Shake over the Italian herbs.
- 7. Roll the dough into a log, starting at the short side. Slice into 2cm pieces and place cut side up on tray.
- **8.** Sprinkle with remaining cheese.
- Bake for 20-25 mins until golden.
