High School Year 7-10

Seeds of knowledge

Maximizing your child's learning is high on the agenda for many parents. As parents, we all hope that our child not only meets educational expectations but exceeds them. And in this context, we are all too familiar with the role teachers and the school play on a child's educational journey. Parents and students need to familiarise themselves with the reality that teachers are only facilitators of a student's education and skills. The term 'facilitator' is more in line with the commonly agreed upon idea that a child's success is highly dependent on support and reinforcement at home. This support comes in the form of parents setting a positive attitude towards their child's learning and being a part of their journey. The second form of support and reinforcement brings me to my main point, which is revision and homework.

Earlier, I mentioned that teachers are facilitators of education whereby they provide all necessary means for the successful education of a student. They only plant the seed of knowledge. It is up to the students and parents to water and nurture this seed by revisiting and exploring all the concepts taught at school. If we want our child to surpass a basic level of understanding of all the content that is studied, by no means should we rely only on school. This becomes more evident as a child moves through their respective stages of schooling, making it more and more crucial to revise, reinforce and water the seed of knowledge so the child can develop a deep and thorough understanding of the content that has been taught. I can clearly say that, unless there is a systematic and comprehensive home study regime, your child will not be able to effectively absorb what is taught at school and will only gain a basic understanding of their school work — and I say this with regards to all KLAs.

In addition to this, revising concepts taught at school does not have to assume a typical classroom setting. Learning should be dynamic and interesting. This can be easily achieved in a home setting with your children. Dynamic learning can meet many objectives such as bonding with kids, teaching them house chores and showing them practical uses of their learning which in turn will motivate your children. We have every intention of ordering these items, then coming up with a marketing campaign to promote and sell these items far cheaper than the retail price of these items from popular retail stores! This is a very authentic and realistic Commerce activity, and will Insha'Allah lay the foundation for our future successful entrepreneurs and HSC Business Studies students.

As always, I would like to finish with advice to parents on establishing a homework routine for the children. It is vital that all homework is completed. Homework is a pillar of modern education, and parents helping their children with homework will undoubtedly notice a marked improvement in results. Further, there is no greater way to teach our children the importance of schooling than to take an active role in their education, and emphasising and ensuring all homework is completed is the first step in this endeavour.


