


Year one took part in a wonderful trip to Taronga zoo this term. This is a recount composed by Mikhail about his experiences at the zoo:



The students were also required to complete an assessment task that allowed them to research the different types of scientists that had an impact on our understanding of electricity.


The ICT tasks and in-class experiments enabled students to have approach the lesson in a fun and exciting way, whilst also allowing them to address the necessary outcomes.

This enabled students to take ownership of their learning, whilst also addressing the outcomes.

The second task was a more detailed assessment, which focuses on a design project that the students worked on all term. The students were required to design a magazine cover and portfolio for an item of their choice and describe it to an audience.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the classes leading up to this project as they felt heavily invested in the project and it allowed them to research an object in which they value.



### **EDUCATION MATTERS**

In 1983, Howard Gardner argued that "reason, intelligence, logic, [and] knowledge" were not the same thing, but rather that intelligence has many aspects and should not be restricted to only mathematical or linguistic ability. Gardner argued that intelligence should be viewed as "the capacity to solve problems or to fashion products that are valued in one or more cultural settings", and by implication, said that different people are 'intelligent' at different things.

For example, while a star soccer player may not be brilliant at mathematics or advanced persuasive writing, his ability to co-ordinate his body with extreme precision is a valued addition to society, and is a form of 'intelligence'. A celebrity Nasheed/Naat reciter would be another example of someone who may not necessarily have the 'intelligence' as it has traditionally been defined. Nevertheless, they contribute something of value to society, and express 'intelligence' in their field which is highly uncommon, oft copied, but rarely matched. This theory has caught on rapidly in the field of education, and has been coined the term "multiple intelligence theory". While a simplistic version of the theory has been explained above, it needs to be emphasised that this is a scientific theory based on a lot of research and recent understandings of the human mind. Having said that, it is also crucial to understand that the theory has a multitude of implications for both teaching and learning. This theory is <u>not</u> meant to be an excuse, but rather a tool for understanding how we learn, and to maximise our results. This theory states that, in effect, there are seven different ways to learn, and that students should learn in the way which works best for them. In a nutshell, 'a person's strength should be used as a learning channel'. As an example, the following simple chart will serve to illustrate the various ways people can learn depending on their 'intelligence' areas:

Task:	Visual	Auditory	Kinesthetic/Physical/Tactile
Operate new equipment	Read instructions	Listen to explanation	Have a go
Travel directions	Look at a map	Ask for spoken directions	Follow your nose and maybe use a compass
Cook a new dish	Follow a recipe	Call a friend	Taste as you cook

As you can see, the multiple intelligence theory does not restrict learning, but rather gives us more options. Without further ado, here are some tips for the more common learning styles, based on the VARK method. Please use Google to find out more information in order to develop your own learning style, as there is very limited space in this newsletter for a more thorough explanation or detailed examples.

Visual Learners: These individuals think in pictures and may learn best from visual displays. Learning strategies include highlighting important points and key words; creating flashcards for key information; limiting amount of words/information in summaries and notes, thereby allowing for mental imagery; converting notes and translating words into symbols, diagrams, and/or pictures; creating colourful and logical mind maps to summarise the whole topic. Please come and see Mr Shakir for examples of mind maps.

Auditory Learners: These learners often benefit from reading the text and notes out loud and/or listening to recorded notes and information from texts. Learning strategies include; working in groups or with a study partner, thereby encouraging discussions, listening, and talking; reading notes and text out loud whenever possible, especially at home; reciting information that is important to remember a few times, especially before exams; recording notes and key information, then listening to these recordings regularly; and using audio books if possible (and remember, it is possible to convert YouTube videos to audio files, which you can then listen to).

Read/Write Learning Style: These learners benefit most from: rewriting notes; reading/reviewing notes on a daily basis; rewriting ideas and principles in their own words or in different words; organising diagrams/graphs into statements and words; writing exam answers and practising past exam papers repetitively (but productively!); writing lists and dot point summaries; and using linguistic mnemonic techniques to memorise long pieces of information.

Note: No one is purely a one-style learner. You may benefit from multiple methods. For example, mind maps tend to work well for everyone, as they mirror the way we learn and link information in our minds.

## Brekky bars

#### **Ingredients**

- ✓ 3/4 cup self-raising flour
- √ 1 cup shredded coconut
- √ 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- √ 1/2 cup pumpkin seeds (pepitas)
- √ 1/2 cup sunflower seeds
- √ 1/3 cup sultanas
- √ 1/3 cup chopped dried apricots
- √ 3/4 cup low-fat milk
- √ 1 egg



#### Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan-forced. Grease a 3cm-deep, 17cm x 27cm (base) slice pan. Line with baking paper, allowing a 2cm overhang at long ends.
- 2. Combine flour, coconut, sugar, pumpkin seeds, sunflower seeds, sultanas and apricot in a bowl. Whisk milk and egg together in a jug. Add to flour mixture. Mix to combine.
- 3. Spoon mixture into prepared pan. Smooth top. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until firm. Stand slice in pan for 15 minutes. Turn out on to a wire rack to cool completely. Cut into 18 pieces. Serve.

Kindergarten is a year of growing. Your involvement, interest and enthusiasm will help make this a wonderful year of growth for teachers, students and yourself. The students will be both excited and intimidated by the big 'first day of school' and it's important, that you, as a parent, know how to deal with it. Your child needs a lending ear especially at the vulnerable stages where they learn the good and avoid the bad. It's important to note that all kids aren't the same. Some kids fit right in the square pegs and some are uncomfortable in the first few weeks, so give your child time.

Try to make after-school time very special with some snacks to pass on and talk about your day so that they feel comfortable and open to talk to you about theirs. Your child may blurt out everything or not talk at all, this is normal. Respect their responses to this new experience. Don't expect too much too soon, if your child's happy, that's a big achievement. The rest will come later.

Keep your child mentally prepared for school and most importantly kindergarten. Explain the basic rules of school so that they aren't unsure of what to do and what to stay away from. Good Luck for your child and to you for being a great parent! Rest will be assured by Western Grammar.
